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Member Spotlight: Woodcraft Rangers

Celebrating 95 years of service, Woodcraft Rangers, an afterschool program serving the Greater Los Angeles area, has grown substantially since its humble, yet ambitious beginnings. Current organization statistics: 480 employees from 81 different cities/districts in LA County spend 630 hours per student in the program per year. There are over 120 different enrichment clubs for students to choose from. Woodcraft Rangers serves tens of thousands of students per year and provides field trip opportunities to nearly half of those it serves.

Woodcraft Rangers, founded by Ernest Thompson Seton, opened its doors to the youth of Los Angeles in 1922. The originating principles of Woodcraft Rangers is character building through a tribal model of organization—service, truth, fortitude, and beauty. During its first two decades, it grew to 94 sites across Los Angeles County, serving over 3,000 children and operated two summer camps.

During the 1940s and 1950s, the organization added an additional summer camp, a year-round camping program, served 7,000 children, and begun providing its services to youth in South and East Los Angeles. Woodcraft Rangers received support from the War Community Chest / Los Angeles Youth Project which aided in the expansion. Neighborhood Advisory Boards were launched to encourage parent participation.

Woodcraft Rangers saw steady growth over the next several decades. The latter half of the 20th century saw a resurgence of expansion through its Youth Employment Education Program. Woodcraft Rangers began creating interest-based afterschool programs and brought National Youth Sports into South Central Los Angeles. Through a partnership with the LAUSD in the 1990s, the year-round facility of Stanley Ranch Camp opened.

With the help and support of community partnerships and local

schools, Woodcraft Rangers and its associated services continues to grow.

NVISION Afterschool Programs (a program of Woodcraft Rangers) are currently offered at over 60 schools, parks, and community centers in and around Los Angeles.

Program Manager Luis “Danny” Salas has been with Woodcraft Rangers since 2005.

Salas says that he loves the work environment of the organization because of the teamwork involved and the positive impact it has on students.

“I’ve worked for retail and office jobs, but I’ve never felt the connection I do when I work with our youth and our staff,” said Salas. “It has been a great experience working with Woodcraft Rangers and knowing that we have influenced so many youth over the years. Some of those students are now adults that work with us while they attend college,” Salas said.

Salas explained that Woodcraft Rangers takes pride in hiring dedicated individuals from all surrounding communities and encourages everyone to engage and inspire youth through the various programs that are offered.

Attending after school programs throughout his childhood, Salas has had firsthand experience in the importance of extracurricular activities as well as having mentors and social opportunities which provide a safe space for students.

Salas grew up in Los Angeles in the early 1990s amidst a background of neighborhood gangs and violence.

“After-school programs helped me stay focused in school and exposed me to multiple sports and art programs I wouldn’t have been involved in otherwise,” Salas said. “This is why I’ve been so dedicated to our Woodcraft Rangers Mission which is ‘Guiding young people as they explore pathways to purposeful lives.’”

The programming/curriculum model of Woodcraft Rangers for schools (grades K-12) is primarily comprised of afterschool programs, but Salas explained that some of the programs

are “plugged-in” throughout the school day—with various focused activities in a variety of subjects—and are also sometimes administered on weekends or before school.

“Woodcraft Rangers engages youth through popular activities such as dance & art, but also cutting edge clubs like stop motion animation, skateboarding, robotics, gardening, knitting, and sports,” Salas said. “We then take advantage of that engagement to inspire youth to learn about the world around them by infusing enrichment activities with science, technology, engineering, math (S.T.E.M.) and academic vocabulary.”

Woodcraft Rangers also provides opportunities for students to showcase their talents and compete through sports competitions, spelling bee competitions, performance arts showcases, and team leadership. Program Director Salas along with other Woodcraft Rangers staff receive feedback from parents, students, and teachers, allowing the organization to customize each program to the needs of individual schools.

Salas shared some testimonials from student participants.

One student from Emerson Elementary said that they like Woodcraft Rangers because of the many programs that interest them. Programs listed by the student included: rugby, robotics, soccer, arts, and crafts. The student found the Woodcraft Rangers events to be fun, teachers to be nice, and a great place to make friends.

Another student from Emerson said: “I like Woodcraft because I like doing art. I love painting. We did a Japanese culture art project and it was a cherry Blossom tree, and after we finished we got to do [more] art. That’s why I love Woodcraft Rangers.”

An 11-year-old Big Bear Residential Summer Camp participant: “I really don’t want to go back home...I mean, I miss my parents and all, but it makes me sad that I won’t see my camp friends again. “I would like to thank Woodcraft *Woodcraft, continue on page 3*

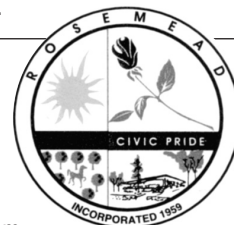

Honoring our Heroes on Memorial Day

On Memorial Day, we honor the soldiers and service members who have given their lives for our nation. Social Security respects the heroism and courage of our military service members, and we remember those who have given their lives in defense of freedom. Part of how we honor service members is the way we provide Social Security benefits.

The unexpected loss of a family member is a difficult experience for anyone. Social Security helps by providing benefits to protect service members' dependents. Widows, widowers, and their dependent children may be eligible for Social Security survivors benefits. You can learn more about Social Security survivors benefits at www.socialsecurity.gov/survivors.

It's also important to recognize those service members who are still with us, especially those who have been wounded. Just as they served us, we have the obligation to serve them. Social Security has benefits to assist veterans when an injury prevents them from returning to active duty.

Wounded military service members can also receive expedited processing of their Social Security disability claims. For example, Social Security will provide expedited processing of disability claims filed by veterans who have a U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Compensation rating of

100 percent Permanent & Total (P&T). Depending on the situation, some family members of military personnel, including dependent children and, in some cases, spouses, may be eligible to receive benefits. You can get answers to commonly asked questions and find useful information about the application process at www.socialsecurity.gov/woundedwarriors.

Service members can also receive Social Security in addition to military retirement benefits. The good news is that your military retirement benefit does not reduce your Social Security retirement benefit. Learn more about Social Security retirement benefits at www.socialsecurity.gov/retirement. You may also want to visit the Military Service page of our Retirement Planner, available at www.socialsecurity.gov/planners/retire/veterans.html.

Service members are also eligible for Medicare at age 65. If you have health insurance from the VA or under the TRICARE or CHAMPVA programs, your health benefits may change, or end, when you become eligible for Medicare. Learn more about Medicare benefits at www.socialsecurity.gov/medicare.

Legislation to Protect Children From Exposure to Marijuana Products Passes Policy Committee

SACRAMENTO – On April 18th, the Assembly Committee on Business and Professions approved two bills, authored by Assemblymember Ed Chau (D-Monterey Park), that are designed to protect children from exposure to marijuana products. AB 175 would establish a packaging and labeling approval process for all edible marijuana products, prior to them being sold in retail stores. AB 76 would prohibit the operator of an Internet Web site or online service, online application, or mobile application from marketing marijuana products or services to a minor, or to a person under the age of twenty-one, in certain circumstances.

“The implementation date that is going to allow for the release of marijuana products into the market is fast approaching and we need to be ready, as a state, to protect children from the marketing of marijuana products,” said Assemblymember Chau. “These bills would ensure that edible marijuana products are in child resistant packaging, and made in a way that is not attractive to children, while also ensuring that online websites and applications that are directed to minors cannot market marijuana products or marijuana businesses.”

In 2012, Colorado and Washington became the first states in the nation to fully legalize marijuana for recreational purposes. Since then, one of the main issues that both states have faced is accidental ingestion and child exposure to marijuana-infused edible products. For example, Colorado experienced a spike in emergency room visits by children who had consumed marijuana

na products, and one instance of an underage individual dying after ingesting marijuana. In an attempt to curb the potential for unsafe packaging and marketing of edible marijuana products to children, Washington requires the State Liquor and Cannabis Board to approve the labeling and packaging for all marijuana infused products, prior to marijuana manufacturers offering these items for sale in retail stores.

Additionally, The Privacy Rights for California Minors in the Digital World, which became effective January 1, 2014, prohibits operators of Internet Web sites, online services, online applications, and mobile applications that are directed to minors from marketing certain types of products or services, such as tobacco and alcohol that minors cannot legally purchase. While the law prohibited drug paraphernalia from being advertised to minors, it did not specifically prohibit the advertising of marijuana, because at the time recreational use of marijuana was not legal in California.

“I want California to learn from the experiences of other states. So, these bills are designed to protect children, as we implement the use of recreational marijuana in a safe and responsible manner.”

Rangers for giving the opportunity to create my own identity,” said Marcelus Wiley, Woodcraft Rangers Alumni.

Salas says he is very proud to work with great school principals, teachers, parents, and a variety of program partners that truly support Woodcraft Rangers.

“We love to work with outside organizations in the community,” Salas said. “We have been fortunate enough to work closely with many community organizations.”

Among the list of outside organizations and partnerships listed by Salas: Rosemead Kiwanis, Rosemead Chamber of Commerce, Rosemead Parks and Recreation, and various school PTA groups.

Other notable partnerships include LA84 and the Laureus Sport for Good foundation.

LA84 is a non-profit foundation providing funding to youth sports organizations throughout Southern California. According to their website, their mission is to promote and expand youth sports opportunities in Southern California and to increase knowledge of sports and its impact on people's lives.

The mission of Laureus Sport for Good is “To help young people overcome the limitations imposed by challenging social issues including juvenile crime, gangs, gun and knife violence, HIV/AIDS, discrimination, social exclusion, landmines awareness

Salas emphasized the need for strategic partnerships in order to continue program funding and expansion.

“We understand that in order to make a complete change in our communities, it is important to partner with our stakeholders and truly provide intentional support,” Salas said. “Our programs are funded by state grants such as our ASES (After School Education & Safety) program grant which hasn't increased funding since its inception in 2002. We understand that minimum wage and cost of living has increased since 2002, but our state grants haven't increased and, therefore, we continue to pursue partners, sponsors, and donations that can help our programs thrive.”

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

Enrollment for our 2017-2018 school year has begun. We have implemented our new

Rep. Chu Introduces SAFE SEAT Act to Protect Passengers from Overbooking and Airline Abuse

Washington, D.C. – On April 9, David Dao, an Asian-American doctor, was forcibly dragged off of a United Airlines flight due to overbooking, sustaining serious injury. In response to the shocking incident, and the community outrage that followed, Rep. Judy Chu (CA-27) has introduced the Saving All Flyers from Ejection and Securing Everyone’s Access to Travel (SAFE SEAT) Act. The SAFE SEAT Act prohibits airlines from forcibly removing a passenger after boarding an aircraft unless necessary for safety or security; requires that all overbooking issues must be resolved prior to letting passengers board; and requires that before any individual is denied boarding a flight, the airline must offer the regulatory maximum amount of compensation to anybody willing to voluntarily give up their seat. Rep. Chu released the following statement:

“Like most Americans, I was shocked and alarmed by the footage of Dr. Dao being violently dragged off a plane after he had already been allowed to take the seat he had paid for. As

United has now recognized in public statements and a legal settlement with Dr. Dao, they failed their customer. But no passenger should be treated like Mr. Dao in the first place. We need to prevent the need for future apologies entirely. And that means addressing the problem of overbooking with common sense solutions.

“While I understand that overbooking flights is a part of the airlines’ internal business model, it cannot be a part of the passenger experience. Nor can it be an excuse for disruption or even violence. That is why my bill prohibits the use of force, with exceptions for safety and security, and requires airlines to resolve overbooking issues before letting passengers board. Finally, it creates an incentive for problem solving by requiring airlines to offer at least the highest amount of compensation required to passengers willing to give up their seats. I hope that we can act quickly on this measure to resolve these problems and give passengers a safer, more reliable, and more enjoyable flying experience.”

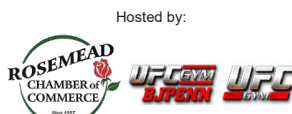

This program offers free tax assistance to individuals and families who earn less than \$54,000, as well as people with disabilities, the elderly, and individuals with limited knowledge of English. 30 IRS certified volunteers and students, under the guidance and direction of UWest's VITA site coordinator Dr. Chi Sheh, worked tirelessly for three months and as a result were able to help 610 families file their taxes... all for free. This total was almost a 20% increase from last year, and as a result of these 610 tax filings, a total of \$717,000 in total refunds were paid back to the pockets of taxpayers in our community.
