## All About Rosemead: Mayor Polly Low Delivers State of the City Address

Late in September, Mayor Polly Low delivered her State of the City address. Among the various topics covered: political structure and hierarchy; past, present, and future plans for the city; crime rate; public safety programs; and annual community events.

The current Rosemead City Council is comprised of Mayor Polly Low, Mayor Pro Tem Steven Ly, Council Member William Alarcon, Council Member Sandra Armenta, Council Member Margaret Clark, and City Manager Bill Manis. Under the city manager falls a number of departments which include: Public Safety, Community Development, Public Works, Parks and Recreations, Technology, Human Resources, Finance, and Risk Management. The City Council is elected by the residents and the City Council selects the City Manager.

The city council relies on a number of commissions to examine the political landscape—examining legislation and making recommendations to the Council. Those commissions include: Traffic

Commission, Planning Commission, and Parks Commission.

The mayor explained that the City Council is like a board of directors. They set the direction for the city. The City Manager (Manis) is like the CEO or Executive Director of the city—they are responsible developing plans and executing the vision set forth by the city council—they make it happen. Below the City Manager is the Assistant City Manager, Brad McKinney, who helps out the City Manager with whatever is needed. The mayor referred to this position as the City Manager's right-hand man.

The Assistant City Manager is tasked with assisting in the areas of human resources, information technology, and risk management. They are also responsible for legislative analysis—any bill that comes from the state, the Assistant City Manager will take a look at it, and if it would have an impact on the city, they will bring it to the City Council's attention. McKinney also manages the public safety depart-

ment. Requests or concerns from residents will be forwarded from the Mayor to the Assistant City Manager for review and resolution.

City Clerk Marc Donohue is responsible for maintaining the city's public records and the city's election process—which includes strict adherence to the Political Reform Act. Donohue is responsible for ensuring that records are kept in accordance with the law at the local, state, and federal levels. Mayor Low credits Donohue for helping to clean up old recordkeeping and modernizing the process.

Rosemead now offers Passport Services to its residents. Individuals seeking to apply for or renew a U.S. Passport can now do so at Rosemead City Hall.

Mayor Low commented on the historical significance to Rosemead City Hall—home to many historical items from the city. The mayor encourages anyone who is interested in the history of Rosemead to come by City Hall to view them and *Mayor, continue on page 8*

## Assemblymember Chau Hosts Appointments Seminar to Encourage Greater Diversity In State Boards And Commissionst

MONTEREY PARK – Assemblymember Ed Chau (D-Monterey Park) recently convened a community seminar, at the Monterey Park Club House, in search of talented and qualified individuals to apply for important positions on state boards and commissions. Over one hundred attendees participated in the seminar, including several local area residents who presently hold, or previously held, appointments.

“I am tremendously gratified by the outpouring of interest from the community to learn how they can become more involved in our state government,” said Assemblymember Chau. “It is only when we have greater representation to reflect our cultural and geographic diversity that we will then be able to craft better public policies.”

The seminar was organized in collaboration with Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon’s Appointments Unit, Governor Jerry Brown’s Appointments Unit, the City of Monterey Park, League of California Cities – API Caucus, and Asian Pacific American Legislative Staff Network (APALS). The seminar included presentations from Nikki Johnson with Speaker Rendon’s office and Lila Mirrashidi with Governor Jerry Brown’s office. Participants at the seminar received packets of information detailing the application process and a list of boards and commissions that constitute California’s government.

“I encourage all constituents who are civically minded to contact my office for more information on the application process,” concluded Assemblymember Chau.



## Supervisor Solis Statement on Disability Pride Month

“Disability Pride Month is a time of celebration, of acceptance, and of feeling proud to be who we are as individuals and as a community. Disability Pride Month serves as an opportunity to change how people think about and define disability. We must end the internalized shame among people with disabilities, and we all bear responsibility to promote a societal belief that disability is a natural and

beautiful part of our human diversity. In this spirit, I am proud to author today’s motion to declare October as “Disability Pride Month” in the County of Los Angeles. It is my hope that this motion will promote full inclusion, including the accommodation of disability in all spaces, overall awareness, visibility of people with disabilities, and redefine the public perception of disability.”

**If you must travel to these areas...**

	Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) approved mosquito spray when outside.
	Wear long sleeved shirts and pants to avoid mosquito bites.
	Stay or sleep in screened-in or air conditioned rooms.

**When you return...**

	Continue to use mosquito spray for 21 days after you travel.
	If you have fever, joint or muscle pain, rash or red eyes during this time, call your doctor and talk about your travel.
	If you’re pregnant, call your doctor and talk about your travel, or your partner’s travel, even if you don’t have symptoms.

## New Law Allows Schools to Donate Food and Milk from Share Tables

SACRAMENTO – Schools across California can now donate their cafeteria leftovers to local foodbanks and charities. Today, Senate Bill 557, authored by Senator Ed Hernandez, O.D., (D-West Covina) and sponsored by the Los Angeles Unified School District, was signed into law by Governor Jerry Brown.

SB 557 allows public schools to donate certain food items to food banks, and will ensure that Californians across the state have access to the food that they deserve

“I am proud the Governor signed SB 557 into law, which gives schools the necessary tools to donate the food they do not use and help local communities suffering from food waste issues,” said Senator Hernandez. “We have millions of Californians who suffer from food insecurity. This is a positive step toward growing a fruitful relationship between schools and local charities in order to protect hungry Californians. Thank you to LAUSD for their continued collaboration to bring this idea into reality.”

Every school day, L.A. Unified serves nearly 650,000 meals to students. Since some children are picky eaters and many youngsters often take more than they can eat, they are allowed to put what they don’t want on share tables. Those items are available for children who want additional food, but the leftovers are thrown into the trash. Not anymore. Unopened prepackaged food, uncut produce like apples, and cartons of milk kept at the appropriate temperature can be given to food banks or other charities, to be distributed free

of charge.

“Thank you to Governor Brown for signing SB 557 into law,” said L.A. Unified Superintendent Dr. Michelle King. “We would also like to extend a special thank you to Senator Hernandez for authoring this important legislation and for his unwavering support. Now, thanks to SB 557, even food and milk that has been served will be put to good use instead of thrown away and wasted. In a District as large as ours, these food donations will provide greater access to nutritious foods, while also helping to reduce child hunger.”

“I think this bill is fantastic,” said Food Service Director Joseph Vaughn. “It removes several barriers that have made it difficult to donate food.”

Donating excess food to charities is not new at L.A. Unified. In fact, the Board of Education passed a resolution, “Healthy Food, Healthy Students, Healthy Communities” in 2011 to allow contributions to charities that serve needy children and families. But, only food and milk that had not been served at our schools could be given away.

“SB 557 will further help the district reduce our organic waste by giving us the ability to donate perfectly good food, instead of introducing it to the waste stream,” said Director for Environmental Health and Safety Robert Laughton, LEED AP, FMP. “For every 20 percent reduction in organic waste, the District will save on average \$45,000 per week in rubbish hauling expenses, and reduce the amount of organic waste going to landfills or other recycling facilities.”

Mayor Polly Low, Mayor Pro Tem Steven Ly, one member from the planning commission, one member from the traffic commission, one member from the Beautification Committee. Meetings are held quarterly. The plan runs the length of Garvey Avenue from New Avenue to San Gabriel Boulevard. It is a fairly lengthy process including the longest piece of the puzzle—the environmental impact report.

“When we were working on the plan, it’s really conceptual,” the Mayor said. “We said we want this, we want this, I think this would be really good for us, and so on. But, as we put the project through this process, we realized that there were certain things that we put in there that really sounds like a good idea, but in reality, the practicality doesn’t quite work.”

A meeting was recently held with members to discuss potential changes and to update the plan as the process continues. The lengthy process might have delayed the plan, but as the mayor noted, it would be wise to have a thorough review resulting in the most feasible plan, rather than to have a plan that may not work out.

The upcoming schedule for the Garvey Specific Plan: In January, a joint meeting will be held between the Planning Commission, the Traffic Commission, and the Beautification Committee to hold a workshop to discuss the current plan further and to hold a public hearing in February or March.

Rosemead’s Finance Director is Pearl Lieu. Rosemead’s financial budget is completely transparent—any resident or anyone else who is interested in examining it may do so upon request.

Mayor Low reported that city revenue from sales tax has increased since last year; in the first quarter, it was 13.5% higher than last year. Also, the city has received new funding for 2017-2018 from Measure M and SB1. Mayor Low says that this additional funding will assist the city in helping with infrastructure—road repaving and a number of issues related to traffic.

Top performers in sales tax revenue include many larger local businesses and large corporate city tenants such as Walmart and Target. The Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT)—a tax collected mostly on hotel stays is way up—\$2.2 million. The top four producers include the DoubleTree Hotel, Motel 6, Fairfield Inn and Suites, and Quality Inn. Those four generate close to 80% of Rosemead’s income from TOT.

Mayor Low reported a balance in the city’s General Fund—money that the city has generated (usually through taxes) that can be used on anything that the city sees fit. Money from a percentage of taxes that come into the city are restricted for use on certain projects such as a portion of sales tax attributed to Measure M must be used on traffic or transportation related projects only. Rosemead’s general fund is balanced which means that city pending is in line with current revenue.

Rosemead Chief of Police Lt. Robert Hahnlein is in charge of Public Safety. There are 12 general patrol deputies in the city, 9 special assignment deputies, and a recently added motor patrol. Some deputies now also patrol the city on bicycles—mostly at parks and special public events.

Rosemead’s Public Safety Center is located at the intersection of Garvey Avenue and Charlotte Avenue at 3018 Charlotte Avenue next to Zapopan Park. It is open Monday through Friday from 7 a.m.-6 p.m. and an additional day has been added to the schedule: Saturday from 10 a.m.-2 p.m.

The City Council is very big on public safety—they want to ensure that all businesses and residents feel safe in their surroundings and public safety programs are a big part of making sure of this.

Rosemead’s Area Watch program has the city divided up into nine areas. Data and statistics about the areas are generated and shared with residents at community meetings and workshops. Meetings are held at locations in each of these 9 areas—making these meetings more accessible to residents. At the meetings and workshops, information is shared and residents are taught ways on how to keep their homes and family safe. This program has been in place since 2014.

The Connection Forum is comprised of community leaders from City Council, School Districts, and local churches. They all come together to discuss crime prevention—such as anti-drug programs. Meetings are held on a regularly scheduled basis.

The Rosemead Business Watch Program started in 2011. Local business leaders come together to discuss concerns and share stories to generate solutions for all local businesses.

Rosemead also has a program called Community Academy. It is a seven-week program where participants learn more about the city, including local law enforcement programs, policies, and procedures.

Rosemead’s Community Emergency Response Team plans for disaster preparedness through education, workshops, and emergency simulation drills.

The City of Rosemead also participates annually in National Night Out—where the entire community is encouraged to participate. It is a community-police awareness-raising event held on a nationwide level on the first Tuesday of August.

City Manager Bill Manis helped start Rosemead’s newest public safety program Quality of Life. Manis leads a 15-person team comprised of city staff, public works personnel, sheriffs, code enforcement agents, and staff from Republic Services. They visit different areas of the community that need to be cleaned up. The team helps clean up the area and connects people with services they may need and benefit from including homeless workshops.

In the area of Public Works, the city of Rosemead completed an ambitious project, the Rosemead Skate Park. Despite disagreements between the mayor and Mayor Pro Tem Steven Ly, Mayor Low agrees on the success of the plan and that it has been beneficial to local youth.

“We’re definitely looking forward to having a place for the youth to hang out and really have a good time,” Mayor Low said.

The mayor showed slides of a variety of before and after images of public works projects. She spoke about the improvements to local parks, highlighting the revitalization of Zapopan Park.

“We revitalized it so that we have a very nice park. It has a walking trail and basketball court,” Mayor Low said. “Again, it is just a nice area for people to just hang out and have a relaxing time.”

Rosemead Park Pedestrian Lighting Project: A walking trail had existed at the park for quite some time, but additional lighting for the paths was recently added—making the park safer in the evening hours. Other noted public works projects mentioned included the resurfacing of Temple City Boulevard and the acquisition of a public works yard. The city purchased a building and repurposed the property as a public works yard. It currently serves as a secure central location used to store city

vehicles and public works equipment.

Jason Chacon serves as Rosemead’s Parks & Recreation Director. This department is responsible for park renovations, the execution of plans for the skate park, school improvement, the military street banner program, the annual Fourth of July parade—preceded by a 5k run and followed by a day-long community festival. This department also oversees the farmers’ market, the 9/11 memorial services, Moon Festival, Fall Fiesta in October, and Christmas tree lighting.

“As much as we work hard in the city, we also play hard and we like that,” Mayor Low said. “As you can see, we in the city really do a lot. We do a lot of fun things. We do a lot of real work—hard work, and we will continue to do so, because we are proud of being in this city, and we are proud of being residents of the city of Rosemead, and we want to make the city the best it can be.”

Assemblymember Ed Chau was in attendance and welcomed by the mayor.

“This is basically a status report to let you know what we have done so far, but what I wanted to talk a little bit about is ‘the going forward’—what are we going to do,” Mayor Low said. “We are very big on promoting economic development, so what we are going to do, actually, is something very exciting. In a couple of weeks we are going to take a delegation to Taiwan.”

The mayor said that the delegation would be comprised of a couple of the Council Members, the City Manager, and a couple of Chamber members. They will go to Taiwan to learn about their economic development, to promote the city or Rosemead, and to build interest in the city.

“We want to continue to improve our public safety,” Mayor Low said. “As some of you might know, our crime rate has gone up and I think that is true in all the cities. That is because of AB109 and Prop 47 and Prop 57.”

These propositions changed the terms of punishments and the definitions of severity on a variety of infractions.

“To clarify, the propositions were voted by the people and I would say, I have received information especially for Prop 57,” Mayor Low continued. “I felt that a lot of the information was very misleading and really people just didn’t know the detail of it, and many people voted for it, so it passed. But, there are actually a lot of side effects. And the side effects are happening now and that is the cause of the crime rate increase. So, we will continue to work with the Sheriff’s Department and see how we can improve in that area. There is a movement going called Taking Back Our Community.”

Many cities on a regional level are banding together to examine current legislature and how to push for amendments and future propositions in order to fix some of the problems that current legislature may be causing for many local cities.

Several cities are on board this unity of legislative oversight and the City of Rosemead is one of them. The city will continue to have council members who serve on different community caucuses and organizations—the Latino Caucus, the API Caucus, the California Contract Cities Association for example, in order to have an influence on future policy making and to share concerns with other caucus members.

The public is invited to attend City Council meetings. Meetings are held every second and fourth Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. at City Hall. City Hall is located at 8838 East Valley Boulevard. Office hours are Monday through Thursday from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m.

learn about their historical significance to Rosemead. The mayor showed a slide of a Monopoly game that used Rosemead streets and landmarks on the game board.

Lily Valenzuela serves as Rosemead’s Interim Community Development Director. The Mayor was very pleased with Rosemead’s progress in the area of community development.

“This year we got selected as one of the finalists as the most business friendly city in Los Angeles County. We have been pushing for economic development for the last ten years,” Mayor Low said. Despite not winning, the mayor noted the significance of that honor—a result of the recent progress made in the city. This year, Rosemead once again has made the list of finalists. “It is so important that we bring development in so that the city can have more revenue in order to provide services to the residents,” Mayor Low concluded. The winner will be announced November 9.

Projects recently completed in the City of Rosemead include the Valley Boulevard Starbuck Drive-Thru—formerly a Taco Bell and the addition of Lucille’s Smokehouse BBQ as a tenant adjacent to The Shops at Montebello. Projects currently under construction: the area of Garvey Avenue and Willard Avenue, Garvey Avenue Corridor as a whole, and the intersection of Garvey Avenue and Delta Avenue. Projects noted as coming soon include the revitalization of the intersection of Garvey Avenue and Del Mar Avenue, the Hampton Inn on Glendon Way near Interstate 10 and Rosemead Boulevard, retailer Ross coming to Rosemead Place, and a 21-unit housing project on San Gabriel Boulevard.

The Garvey Avenue corridor is a major focus of the city. The Garvey Specific Plan started in 2014 with a goal of making it easier for developers to come into the city and build. Rosemead has selected MIG as the consultant to help develop the plan on how best to revitalize the Garvey Corridor. Questions examined include what steps and plans are best for developing the commercial corridor and what impact will it have on surrounding residents.

“How do we make it so that Garvey looks really nice so that developers come in and revenue can be generated from it?” was the general question posed by the mayor during her speech.

Five members oversee the Garvey Specific Plan. Those members include
