

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
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Rosemead Chamber Welcomes Pop Rock Academy and founder Paul Kwo

Kwo, an actor, musician, and voiceover artist has studied and practiced in the performing arts and also taught others since the age of 12, has been successfully operating his academy for the last decade. Currently located in Temple City, the academy is here to provide classes to young students interested in pursuing a career in the field of performing arts as well as a means to strengthening communication skills and self confidence. The Rosemead Report had an opportunity to speak with Kwo about the academy, his professional background, his thoughts on the industry, and his hopes and goals for his students.

"I taught all my life," Paul Kwo said. "I was teaching since I was like a teenager...at my home, I taught piano...I got my first piano student when I was literally 12 years old."

Kwo revealed some of his extracurricular activities when he was a child. He taught Sunday school, vacation Bible School, and coached the speech and debate team at Gabrielino High School for a few years.

Kwo has been involved in performing arts since he was a child. He graduated from USC with piano performance as his major with minors in theater and musical theater. and introduced me to more people, and so I want do the same for the next generation." explained that students would still be able to create and stream online, but having students

In 2011, Kwo worked with a friend who created a summer camp (Glee Summer Camp) helping her with music directing. Eventually, his friend opened up her own school in Atwater Village focusing on acting, dancing, and music. It was then, that Kwo knew he wanted to open his own 'triple threat' school in the San Gabriel Valley—a school that he says he didn't have access to locally as a child.

The search began in 2011 with Kwo finding a location to open his school, in Alhambra. He would be there for nine years, but was forced to shut down in 2020 due to the pandemic. He kept the academy alive and adapted the classes so that he could continue to teach his students online.

"There was definitely a learning curve," Kwo said. "The most difficult part was doing it in one weekend. In one weekend, we had to shut down, lockdown, and move everything online. So that first weekend, figuring out the logistics was like completely starting a new business online. Like everyone else, you know, we had to relearn everything in one weekend."

While shifting a performing arts school to


explained that students would still be able to create and stream online, but having students come in-person to the academy allows students access to professional gear that students would likely lack access to at home. He noted that the current acting program is part in-person and part streaming.

He also noted that some of the music and dance programs now have an element of streaming involved. For an upcoming recital in December, rather than perform in person, it will be streamed.

"Learning how to perform for the camera is one of the objectives of our school as well," Kwo said. "We're taking this opportunity to give our students these experiences."

Having a variety of skills can help land jobs and Kwo explained that there are two sides to that coin. As he explained, some individuals may choose to focus on a single talent and become the absolute best they can be at one talent, whether it be acting, singing, dancing, or playing an instrument, but for those who are open to broadening their skills, being versatile in the industry can also help as it has helped Kwo, himself.

"I like to be very honest with my students.



"When I got out of college, I meandered a little bit around...and tried to figure out my life, and what to do with it," Kwo said. "Eventually, one day, I woke up and I was like, 'I'm going to be an actor. I'm in LA, why not? Let's give it a try!""

Kwo soon got himself an agent and had begun auditioning all while entering the master's program at USC for composition. Following the completion of his master's degree, Kwo decided to pursue working as an actor professionally.

Kwo devoted himself to fulltime and booked work on some national commercials, TV shows, and films. He also got involved in voiceover work as well—working on such major titles as Black Panther, Crazy Rich Asians, and Shang-Chi, to name a few.

"I do a lot of voiceovers...mostly because I speak Mandarin and Cantonese as well as English, so I can do all three languages," Kwo said. "So anytime when a movie or TV show needs some multilingual voiceover work, I'm there. So that's how I got in. I met some really good people, and they helped me along the way

an online atmosphere was challenging, Kwo noted that there were some advantages to a shift to online learning. Kwo said that while some students did face some challenges with a shift to online learning, students worked to overcome those challenges and the majority of students thrived with the new online learning environment, and it also exposed them to the creative use of online technologies that hadn't been explored prior.

Students and teachers collaborated on online performances and learned streaming platforms and new ways to produce content remotely.

"We figured we're going to let our kids experience this 21st century medium of performing online and so we did a weekly Twitch show for the last year and a half online," Kwo said. "It gave our students an opportunity to livestream themselves and to have a platform to continue expressing themselves. They learned a lot and I think it was very useful."

The school resumed in-person classes in October when they opened up at their new location in Temple City. Though in personclasses have resumed, the online element of teaching and learning has continued. Kwo They have aspirations, and I give them the truth of what it takes and what's required of them, so that then they can decide, and they can always change their minds later," Kwo said. "It's not something that you have to always do...you don't have to make a decision when you're five years old.

"I don't like to sugarcoat things and make false hopes and promises to any of my students. I like to give them the rundown of how it actually works and what you need to do. I do believe if you have the passion for it, you can do it. But you have to have the passion for it and if you're doing it because 'I want to be famous,' then it's like, this is not the industry for you."

Kwo explained that it is important for children to explore their career paths which can lead to the discovery of a new passion or the development of a new skill set.

"I don't think my parents ever thought I'd be an actor," Kwo said. "I don't think anyone around me when I was a kid thought, 'He's going to be an actor.' I was not outgoing. I was very shy. I literally had a teacher who gave me a personality quiz [and said] 'I don't know

Assemblymember Chau Hosts Ninth Annual "Operation Gobble" – Turkey Giveaway

Monterey Park – Today, Assemblymember Ed Chau, in partnership with the San Gabriel Valley Water Company, California American Water Company and Golden State Water Company, hosted the 2021 Operation Gobble in the City of Monterey Park. This is the ninth consecutive year of the event in collaboration with local food banks, community-based organizations, and local water companies, to allocate turkeys for vulnerable populations in the 49th Assembly District. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and physical distancing protocols still in effect, turkeys were retrieved via a drive-thru.

"Many Angelenos struggle with food access or are unable to eat regular meals due to lack of money or resources. In fact, a recent study revealed that nearly one million residents in LA County experience food insecurity," said Assemblymember Chau. "The holiday season is a time for gratitude and sharing with others. Thankfully, the nonprofits we partnered with today serve as an avenue to getting food to those with the most need."

Assessor Partners with Oracle to Bring Operations into 21st Century

Migration from on premise to Oracle Cloud Infrastructure (OCI) improves user experience, reduces risks, and cuts data processing time in half

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 4, 2021 /PRNewswire/ -- The Los Angeles County Office of the Assessor has successfully migrated its Assessor operations from a paper-based, legacy mainframe environment to Oracle Cloud Infrastructure (OCI). By moving to Oracle Cloud, the Office is able to speed up data processing, reduce risk, and improve the user-experience. Using a series of OCI services including Oracle Autonomous Data Warehouse, Oracle Analytics Cloud, Oracle Exadata Cloud Service, and Oracle Database Cloud Service, LA County is seeing dramatic improvements in performance and achieving significant cost savings by eliminating its on premise infrastructure.

As the largest local assessment agency in the country, the Los Angeles County Office of the Assessor reviews more than 400,000 property documents and completes 500,000 physical property appraisals each year. This work was previously conducted with a paper process using 40-year-old mainframe technology that required manuals to interpret its code. With such a high volume of assessments, compounded by California's complex requirements, the Assessor's Office realized this model wasn't sustainable. The Office began work on a five-phase Assessor Modernization Project (AMP) to develop an in-house custom application with Oracle Consulting. After three successful phases, the AMP application became the go-to production system for the Assessor. During the fourth phase of the project in February 2021, Oracle Consulting and the Assessor's Office extended AMP functionality and moved the application from on-premises to OCI with no disruptions, while eliminating 80 servers. "The decision to move AMP to Oracle Cloud Infrastructure midway through the project had huge benefits, including cost savings, better performance, flexibility, and resource efficiencies," said Kevin Lechner, CIO, Los Angeles County Office of the Assessor. "We could now focus our attention on application development and increased productivity rather than infrastructure requirements and maintenance."



Hilda Provides Support for Mental Health

LOS ANGELES, CA – Nov.16, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved a motion authored by Chair Hilda L. Solis, Supervisor to the First District, and co-authored by Supervisor Kathryn Barger on assessing the mental health resources and support available for students.

"Each year, the need for effective student and youth mental health support continues to grow, with one in six youth reporting experiencing a mental health disorder each year. Unfortunately, half have reported not receiving any kind of treatment in recent history. Schoolbased mental health services delivered by trained mental health professionals on site are key to addressing the rising incidence of mental health disorders amongst our youth," shared Chair Solis. "With the influx of funding and resources into the County's schools to address mental health, it is critical that our departments be positioned to help provide technical assistance and support. By working together, we can make a significant difference in the lives of children to keep them safe and healthy."

A study published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in November of 2020 found that compared to the prior year, emergency department mental health-related visits for children aged 5-11 increased by 24%, while visits for children aged 12-17 years old increased by 31%. The CDC partly attributed this increase to the fact that many children receive mental health services through clinical and community agencies, such as schools. With schools necessarily closed for in-person instruction early in the pandemic with cases rising and no vaccines or treatment available, children went without the means to access the appropriate mental health resources needed to respond to this unprecedented adverse childhood experience.

Through the American Rescue Plan, over \$122 billion was appropriated for K-12 schools to safely re-open and to address the many impacts of COVID-19 on education. This includes strategies to meet the social, emotional, and mental health needs of students, as well as to hire additional personnel, such as nurses or mental health professionals, to keep schools safe and healthy. Additionally, the State of California's 2021-2022 budget package provided funding for numerous programs in K-12 education, including \$25 million in funding to develop mental health and wellness instructional resources and trainings for educators, students, and caregivers to address the pandemic's impact on mental health.

"The mental health needs of our youth must be a priority," shared Supervisor Barger. "Every available mental health support resource must be harnessed to help young people in our schools and their families get the support they need. It's only through partnerships with teachers, school administrators and campus resources that we can effectively bridge the service gap."

The motion approved today instructs the County's Department of Mental Health, working with the Office of Education, to design a questionnaire/survey to be distributed to the 80 school districts in Los Angeles County on mental health needs and report back to the Board in 30 days with the final questionnaire, with a corresponding plan to distribute and engage the County school districts for responses. The motion also requests a report back within 120 days with the data and analysis from the questionnaire, and next steps to address the needs identified by the information collected, including engaging with community partners and the County's Mental Health Commission on opportunities to support and address the needs identified.



On OCI, data processing jobs that once took up to eight hours are now processed in four; built-in Disaster Recovery is helping mitigate risk; and end users are seeing faster page loads than ever before. Soon, the Los Angeles County Office of the Assessor plans to open access to AMP for other counties in the state.

"The Los Angeles County Office of the Assessor's modernization project is one of the most forward-thinking government agency endeavors we've seen in recent years," said Jeff Kane, group vice president, Oracle Consulting, North America. "We're looking forward to seeing additional performance enhancements and cost savings they'll realize on OCI services, freeing up their IT staff to innovate with new features and functionality on the platform."

"One of my top goals coming into this Office was to make sure that we provide public service that is both effective and cost-efficient," said Jeff Prang, Los Angeles County Assessor. "This milestone of the project with Oracle Cloud Infrastructure is our biggest success to date."



Dear Rosemead Community,

We are excited to share that on Monday, November 9, we welcomed back 7 students to our Shuey Full Day Preschool Program. Our Shuey preschool program had been on a rollercoaster ride as we were days away from opening during the summer only to have to cancel those plans as a result of the huge increase in COVID-19 cases in July and August. Our Shuey preschool program serves many children of first responders and essential workers. As such, our parents have been eagerly anticipating the reopening of the program. I would like to thank our amazing Shuey preschool instructional staff for their hard work preparing for our students to return.





Thanks to additional flexibility from our county department of public health, we are now allowed to host up to 25% of a school's tidal student body for in-school small cohort instructional support. Our teams are in the process of identifying additional students for this support.




