Herald Christian Health Center Celebrates **15 Years of Service**

Their mission: 'To provide high quality and affordable holistic health care to the low-income and underserved."

'At Herald Christian Health Center, we believe health care should be available and affordable for everyone. That's why we provide comprehensive services to all walks of life, regardless of their race, color, religion, gender, disability, and age. Every time we open the door, our care teams are ready to serve with healing hands and a loving heart.'

The Herald Christian Health Center (HCHC) will be celebrating 15 years of service to the community in 2022. With its beginnings in San Gabriel with their first clinic, they have expanded to additional locations in Rosemead, El Monte, City of Industry, and San Diego. The clinic continues to play a major role in the health and wellness of the community providing a variety of health care services. The Rosemead Report had an opportunity to speak with co-founder and CEO of Herald Christian Health Center, Carolin Eng to discuss the clinic's past, present, and future.

Eng has been a registered nurse by trade since 1977 with experience as an oncology nurse providing immense compassion and care for all of her patients.

"I volunteered at Herald Cancer Association,

\$100,000 was raised—\$10,000 from each of operation ever since—shifting their efforts to 10 medical professionals. This refers to their initial donor fundraising effort of 10-10-10. Later, to help support the clinic's opening and operations, they started their fundraising campaign of 3-2-5—where the goal was for 300 people to donate \$2000 per year for five years. With that seed money, they were able to open the first Herald Christian Health Center in San Gabriel in 2007.

Eng initially served as COO for HCHC with co-founder and Herald Community Center executive director David Lee serving as CEO on a part-time basis. As the clinic continued to grow, Lee stepped down to focus on the community center and Eng stepped up to become fulltime CEO of HCHC.

A major milestone for Herald Christian Health Center came in 2013 when it was designated as a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) moving forward. Around this time, with Obamacare, there was an increase in Medi-Cal patients and as Eng explained, many of the doctors in the community weren't seeing Medi-Cal patients. Becoming a FQHC allowed the clinic to serve these patients and receive federal support.

Throughout its history and during its expansion, HCHC has been recognized for their outstanding work. Some of the most recent achievements over the past 5 years: In 2016, The Joint Commission awarded the Gold Seal and certified HCHC as a Primary Care Medical Home. In 2020, LA Care awarded HCHC as the Top Performing Clinic of the year in Adult Care. And this past year, HCHC was selected as a 2021 California Nonprofit of the Year by Assemblymember Ed Chau.

various locations around the community with vaccinations taking place over the summer at Rosemead Community Center (which became a permanent home for the project). Also for the past two months, they have administered vaccinations at Garvey School District. To date the clinic has administered over 45,000 doses of the COVID-19 vaccine.

Most recent developments for the expansion of HCHC revolve around their location in El Monte at 3401 Aerojet Avenue. For this expansion project, there will be a fundraiser called the El Monte 3401 Project. Eng explained that there will be a 3401 Donor Recognition Wall for donors who meet one of two criteria: Pledging for 3 years to donate \$4,000 each year or a one-time donation of \$10,000. For this expansion HCHC recently purchased a 27,000 square foot building. The goal is to raise \$2 million for tenant improvements.

Those looking to volunteer at the Herald Christian Health Center can currently do so as there is always a need for volunteers to assist in administering vaccinations at their locations or at the outreach programs taking place around the community. Many volunteers come from students enrolled in health-related curriculum or student-nurses. Anyone interested in helping out or interested in a career in healthcare should reach out to see how they can work with HCHC to provide assistance and to gain experience in the field.

which is a part of the Herald Community Center, mainly serving the cancer patients in the Chinese population in San Gabriel Valley," Eng said. "When I was volunteering at Herald Cancer Association, I saw a lot of new immigrants who were uninsured, and they were afraid to go to the doctor because they didn't have any insurance, and by the time they're diagnosed with cancer, they're at a late stage.

"So this dream of actually starting a community clinic for the uninsured...new immigrants with limited language capacity, and no knowledge of where to go, started in 2006."

Eng explained that in 2006, the board and planning committee of the non-profit Herald Community Center began discussing the idea and plans for opening a health clinic.

"The board and planning committee at Herald Community Center decided that if it's God's will for us to start this community clinic for the uninsured, low income people, then they asked for a sign, and at that point, they decided that if within 10 days, we can raise \$10,000 each by 10 medical professionals, then we will start...that means it's a sign from God for us to start this clinic."

Eng said that within less than 10 days,

Services provided by the clinic have expanded over time as they've grown.

'We provide dental, behavior health, optometry, acupuncture and enrollment service—which means people could come to our clinic and enroll into either Covered California or Medi-Cal and, and also we are growing our social services department as well," Eng said.

During the pandemic, Eng explained the growing need to assist new EDD claimants who were facing difficulties with the application process or facing technological and/or language barriers in navigating the system. There was also a need for coordinating COVID testing and vaccinations for patients and the surrounding communities in which they serve. This is where their social services department came in to help create, manage, and facilitate these programs.

HCHC's community vaccination program began in February of last year and has been in

"Fourteen years ago, I could have never imagined that HCHC would open four clinic sites that altogether serve more than 13,000 patients every year," Eng said in a statement. "I will never forget how we started our first small clinic in San Gabriel with the tremendous support and faithful prayers from many of you who are here with us today.

"Back then, we did not have any public funding at all, yet we were able to provide medical and dental care to the sick, and show our kindness to the poor. I thank God every day for rewarding our being compassionate to people who need healing for their body, their mind, and their souls. The best reward I can ever ask for is: our dedicated staff and people who share our mission, like you."



Scam Alert: Avoid COVID-19 **Testing Fraud**

The Los Angeles County Department of Consumer and Business Affairs (DCBA) has recently received questions and consumer complaints about COVID-19 testing sites. Some consumers have inquired about suspicious-looking pop-up testing sites. Some have taken tests and not received results in the timeframe promised, and some claimed to not receive their test results at all.


As demand for COVID-19 tests reaches an all-time high, DCBA and LA County reminds consumers to use caution and good consumer safety practices when seeking a testing site or at-home testing kit.

USE A VERIFIED LA COUNTY COVID TESTING FACILITY

As the need for testing increases, it's important to note that not all COVID-19 testing sites in Los Angeles County are affiliated or operated by the LA County government. COVID testing sites are also being operated by private companies, private health care systems, and local municipalities. Some privately operated sites even charge for their testing services.

Congresswoman Judy Chu Progresses Admist Challenge Faced in 2021

Despite the historic challenges we faced, I am proud to have continued delivering for CA's 27th Congressional District last year. Here's a quick look at some of what we got done for the San Gabriel Valley in 2021. And there's much more to come!

My local district offices have also been very successful this past year in helping residents of the district with federal matters, including access to over \$100k in benefits. Here are some stories I am proud to share with you about how our office has helped some of our constituents, and how I can also help you

\$150,000 in Veteran Backpay

An 80-year-old military veteran from the city of Rosemead who was honorably discharged needed to prove his US citizenship to obtain retroactive and current Social Security (SS) benefits because he was born in Canada to an American mother. He first applied for his SS benefits in 2007, but was denied in 2008 because he was told he did not have sufficient proof of citizenship. Over the course of three years, my office worked with the constituent to reach out to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), the Social Security Administration (SSA), and even Passport Services to ensure he had proper documentation and could receive the benefits he was entitled to. Eventually, we referred the constituent to legal services, where an attorney was able to prove that USCIS was in violation of their own regulations, and that the resident was in fact eligible to receive a Certificate of Citizenship. USCIS finally approved his certificate, and since then my office has been working with SSA to release his retroactive benefits from 2007. After some processing, \$100,000 in backpay was just released to him, and he is expecting another \$50,000 in the coming months in benefits he is rightly owed.

Green Card Approval

Another constituent who lives in Arcadia submitted all the documents that USCIS requested per a Request for Evidence (RFE) notice on his green card case. However, three months later, his application hadn't been updated to reflect the submitted documents. He was worried that it had been lost and that he would need to spend another \$900 to get the documentation again. He requested assistance from my office to check on the status of his paperwork so he could travel to see his elderly parents in India. We followed up with USCIS, and after some doublechecking on the part of USCIS, the agency contacted the constituent directly and admitted that they only had the paperwork for two of the 4 family members in the application. The other two family members' medical documents were somehow missing. The constituent was asked to resubmit the original documents for the other two family members. The constituent resubmitted the original documents in person, and his green card was approved that day.

Supervisor Solis' Statement on **Creating an Awareness Campaign** for Federal and State Student Loan Forgiveness Programs

Los Angeles County Supervisor Hilda L. Solis, First District, released the following statement after the Board of Supervisors unanimously approved her motion on creating an awareness campaign for federal and state student loan forgiveness programs:

LA County does not have oversight over testing sites not directly operated by LA County Department of Health Services.

USE LA COUNTY'S NEW GRAB-AND-GO TESTS

This week, LA County has introduced a "Pick-Up Testing Kit" program and is encouraging residents to visit one of 13 County-run locations to pick up a PCR test, perform the test themselves, and return it to a testing site to be processed.

AVOID POSSIBLE PHONY TESTING SITES

Like with any other purchase or contract, it's best to stick to the institutions or companies you know and trust when choosing to get a COVID-19 test. If a so-called testing site appears in an unusual setting or acts in an unprofessional manner, beware of possible fraud. It's possible that thieves may be seeking your personal, medical, or insurance information to commit fraud. Some might charge you money upfront for a phony in-person or at-home test.

If you believe you have visited a fake COVID-19 pop-up site or purchased a fake COVID-19 at-home test, please report it to us at bit.ly/DCBAHelp or call (800) 593-8222.

If you believe your personal or financial information was stolen, follow our tips to avoid and report identity theft.

REPORT PRICE GOUGING

If you have purchased an at-home COVID-19 test and believe you were unfairly overcharged, report it to DCBA using our online tool: stoppricegouging.dcba.lacounty.gov.

"Given that the U.S. Department of Education has recently set forward a number of actions that will restore the promise of Public Services Loan Forgiveness Program (PSLF) through a limited waiver that will end on October 1, 2022, making County employees and eligible community members aware of this news is critical. The COVID-19 pandemic has had a tremendous impact on the lives of our constituents and County employees, including financial burdens. To that end, my hope is that through this motion our County workforce and residents learn about how these programs provide invaluable opportunities to reduce or eliminate their student debt.'

County employees are eligible for the PSLF program if they have worked at the County for the required number of years and have qualifying loans. Additionally, residents who work for nonprofit agencies are also eligible for these programs. However, despite being eligible, many are not aware of the programs.

The Education Data Initiative reports that, according to the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), there are 3.2 million new student loan borrowers, and that along with a spike in unemployment, we are witnessing the largest increase in the total student loan debt since 2013. This is certainly true in California, where Californians owe the largest cumulative student loan debt: 3.86 million Californians, or 9.8% of the State's population, have some form of student debt; the total amount of student loan debt in California is \$142.7 billion; 53.4% of student loan borrowers are under the age of 35. Additionally, a growing body of research points to startling inequality in the debt burdens carried by minorities, an inequality that in many cases was further exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The motion approved today directs the County's Department of Human Resources in collaboration with the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs and its Center for Financial Empowerment to create an awareness campaign to educate employees and constituents on loan forgiveness programs and return with recommendations in 60 days on how to implement the campaign.
